It has been an action-packed Spring and Summer at The Dingle with lots of trips, visitors, workshops and events as well as our excellent curriculum being taught in the classroom!




The DINGLE TIMES team...

MUSICIANS PERFORM IN CONCERTS

There was a large audience in the church hall and there were other local schools and groups performing as well as soloists and ensembles.

CHILDREN SAFETY RULES

Members of the NSPCC came into school and brought Buddy the speech bubble to carry out work with Year 6 about how important it is to speak out and stay safe.

They found out about different situations where children may need to speak out and get help and what to do if they needed help.

The whole school has assemblies about this as well.



PUPILS TRAVEL BACK TO ANCIENT GREECE

As part of the topic about Ancient Greece, the Year 5 children had some visitors into school to work with them for the day about the Ancient Greeks. They first spent time travelling back to Ancient Athens and Ancient Sparta to discover what life was like there and what sorts of things people did. They tried on costumes, acted out short sketches and handled artefacts to find out about life there.



In the afternoon, the children came together in the hall to find out about the theatre and traditional music and stories from Ancient Greece.. They took part in dances and drama to find out about this. They also played traditional Ancient Greek games an d had chance to ask questions about life for the Ancient Greeks. It was a great day for all.

SCHOOL RAISES CHARITY FUNDS

At The Dingle, we raise lots of money for different charities. Children came to school wearing red on Friday 19th May to raise money for a charity called Annabelle's Challenge that supports children and their families who have VEDS. It was called 'Reds for Veds Day' and children each donated £1 to the charity for wearing red that day. We raised lots of money to support the charity.



MINIBEAST HUNTING AT 'LITTLE WOODPECKERS'

Reception went to Little Woodpeckers on a school visit. It is an outdoor area in woods that has lots to do there. The weather was nice and dry luckily! They had a lovely time learning about minibeasts. There was lots to do there including balancing equipment, mud kitchen, builders area, water investigations, fairly corner, rope swings, hammocks and bug hotels.



They all made minibeasts from clay and other natural materials like leaves, pine cones and twigs. They also got to toast and eat marshmallows around a campfire. This was definitely a favourite part of the day!

'SHALOM' FROM ERIC

On Wednesday 29th March, Eric Cohen (a Jewish man who had previously shown Year 6 around the synagogue in Liverpool) told year 6 about his family's traumatic experiences during the Holocaust and how this affected Jewish people and the restrictions they had to live by. He also gave an assembly to year 1 about Jewish beliefs and objects that Jews might have in their homes and in a Synagogue.

He talked to Year 6 about his family's experiences in World War 2 and how the Nazis discriminated against Jews and how we must not repeat these acts in society ever again.



RECYCLING BUS COMES TO SCHOOL

The children in Key Stage 2 spent some time on the recycling bus that came to school for the day. They found out about which items can be recycled in the grey bins and were told what happens to these items when they get recycled.

The eco warriors in school have been encouraging children to recycle and we have waste paper and old ink pens collections each week so that these items are recycled and do not go to landfill sites.



BALANCE SKILLS IMPROVE WITH BIKES

All the children in Reception have learnt to ride using balance bikes and then bikes with pedals over a week. The instructors taught them how to balance on the bikes and to glide without tipping over. They then showed them how to ride using the pedal bikes after a few days. They taught them how to stop safely as well! The children were amazing and are so good at riding now!

The Year 5s also took part in their Bikeability Level 2 training on the roads and Year 4 did Level 1 on the playground.



CHILDREN ENJOY ZOG THEATRE SHOW

Reception children went to the theatre in Crewe to watch the story of Zog. They had read the book before they went so they were familiar with the story. They went on a double decker bus which was very exciting! Zog was performed by people dressed up in costumes and using puppets to tell the story. The children had to help and join in for some of the show. It was a really good show and the children loved it.

They will read more Julia Donaldson stories in Year 1 next year.



PUPILS LEARN VITAL LIFE SKILLS

The pupils in Year 6 took part in workshops to learn some vital life skills such as first aid and sign language.

First, they took part in an hour-long sign language workshop where they learnt basic words, greetings, colours and songs in British Sign Language.

The children all copied Derek's actions and put together short sentences using simple signs.



They then learnt some basic first aid about dealing with cuts and nose bleeds and how to do CPR.



PIRATES OF THE CURRYBEAN

TAKES CENTRE STAGE

On Tuesday 14th March, Drama club performed Pirates Of The Currybean to their family. The play took four months to perfect and even featured a gorilla (played by Mr G). It featured children from Years 3, 4 and 5.



It was about the pirates and the sailors who fought against each other then realised they shared one leader- Captain Swaggersword. Mr Dowel (a year three teacher) directed and ran Drama club. Jemima S -a stand-out performer- said “My favourite part was scene four when I was kidnapped by the pirates because in that scene, I had to be very fierce and demanding. I like that type of character, so it was fun to play that part.”

Rohan’s favourite part was when the gorilla sprinted on stage. That made people jump out of their skin. Maddie loved being a parrot because when she got to talk to pearl (the mother). Isla stated “I loved being Slack (a comedy sailor) because I loved saying the jokes.” Jack’s favourite line was ‘O she’s quite good at this ‘because it was quite a funny joke.

Drama club is planning to perform another play, next year, but the play is yet to be confirmed.



CHILDREN EXPERIENCE STONE AGE LIFE

The children in Years 3 and 4 went on a trip to Tatton Park to take part in activities about the Stone Age and found out what life was like in Stone Age times.

They looked at some of the tools that people would have used and their houses and how they were built. They also found out about what their daily life was like and what sorts of activities they would do like hunting for food and cooking.



BLUE PLANET TRIP FUN

Year 2 went on a trip to the Blue Planet Aquarium to find out about life under our seas and oceans. They were shown lots of different creatures that live under the sea and found out about what they eat and how scientists can find out about them.

They saw some divers in the tanks with the animals.



Everyone enjoyed the trip and they found out lots about the sea creatures. Some of the creatures were much bigger than they thought they would be!

PUPILS VISIT WAR MUSEUM

On March 9th Year 6 went on a school trip to The Imperial War Museum in Manchester to learn more about WW1 and WW2.

They had worksheets and went around the museum to find information to fill in the worksheets and in between there were short films of what happened in both world wars. Some were about different animals that were used and different people's experiences.

Sophia said, "It was really good and I learnt lots more about the war."



Gabi commented, "It was amazing and I would go again!"

Georgy said, "The most interesting part was the planes and the uniforms they wore."

There were different smells in the trenches like mustard gas, chlorine and trench foot. There were cars, Fighter jets, Tanks and other vehicles and equipment from the wars to see.

CHILDREN ENJOY 'GRUFFALO' EXPERIENCE AT SEASIDE

The children in Year 1 went on a trip to Blackpool to visit The Gruffalo and other Julia Donaldson characters at a new centre there.

They heard stories, danced, sang and played with the characters in a magical Gruffalo world. The children also had an ice cream on the sea front afterwards and saw the sea and some of the seaside attractions in Blackpool.



Year 1 had been reading lots of the Julia Donaldson books earlier in the year so they loved seeing the characters brought to life.



SCHOOL COUNCIL RUN BOARD GAMES CLUB

After carrying out surveys in each class, the school council decided to run a board games club on Friday lunchtimes for lots of different year groups each week.
